Strategically located for growth



BlueScope's Master Plan at Port Kembla will see over 200 hectares of industrial land transformed for the community – that is the equivalent size of Circular Quay to Central Station in Sydney.


More cost effective

Wollongong's office space is over 50% more affordable than Sydney CBD.

Wollongong offers businesses significant cost advantages. Office space is over 50% more affordable than Sydney CBD and 30% cheaper than Parramatta, enabling businesses to scale profitably while enjoying premium facilities.

Businesses in Wollongong tend to enjoy lower staff turnover due to Wollongong's exceptional lifestyle and shorter commuting times.

Proximity to Sydney

Wollongong is only 70 minutes drive from the new Western Sydney airport.

Wollongong is strategically located just one hour from Sydney, its major airports, and global markets.

The city is also only 2.5 hours from Canberra and 70 minutes from both the Sydney and the new Western Sydney Airport in development, creating a unique advantage for businesses with national and international reach.

Shellharbour Airport – local airport 15 minutes south of the city with daily flights to Brisbane and Melbourne



A lifestyle worth moving for

Wollongong combines natural beauty, cultural vibrancy and accessibility to create an integrated lifestyle that's difficult to match.

90% of residents call Wollongong a great place to live: With residents reporting high satisfaction across safety (87%), personal relationships (86%) and standard of living (84%), it's no surprise that Wollongong businesses report higher employee satisfaction.

Less time commuting for higher quality downtime: Most residents can access work, education and recreation within 20-30 minutes, supported by shorter commutes and a growing cycleway network. This means happier, healthier, and more productive teams.

World-class infrastructure and amenities: The city is home to a major teaching hospital, private healthcare options, 89 quality schools, TAFE, and a top ranked university, ensuring access to toptier services and education for the whole family.

Stunning coastal setting: With 17 patrolled beaches alongside the Illawarra escarpment, employees and loved ones can enjoy outdoor activities, social sport networks, coastal paths, and parks within minutes from home.

A city on the move: The Wollongong CBD

Contrary to other cities in Australia, the Wollongong CBD has seen a 50% uplift in new A-Grade office space in the last 5 years.

The Wollongong CBD is the largest employment hub in the region, accounting for 30% of the Wollongong region's employment (28,000 workers).

The CBD is the region's hub for health and government services, alongside ICT, financial and shared services covering local, national and international customers.

There is over 40,000sqm of potential A-Grade office space in the pipeline, including the 10,000sqm 111 Crown St building under construction, making Wollongong a great location to establish a satellite office, new business or remote



A-grade developments in the pipeline

There are a number of exciting, approved A-grade office developments within the Wollongong CBD that have yet to commence construction.

The two largest projects are the WIN Grand Development and The Globe, both on Crown Street, Wollongong.



Win Grand Development

The WIN Grand site is located at the western end of Crown Street close to Wollongong railway station. In December 2022, WIN Grand received planning approval for Wollongong's largest ever mixed-use development.

In March 2024, the site sold in a record setting \$70M land transaction. In October 2024, the new owners revealed revised plans for a \$500M State Significant Development project including 578 apartments, a 204-room hotel and an 11-storey 7,000sqm commercial office building.



The Globe

The Globe is another large \$230M mixed-use development approved in December 2024, across two city blocks bordered by Crown Street Mall, Church Street, and Burelli Street in the heart of the Wollongong CBD.

The project will encompass three distinct buildings, each designed to serve a unique purpose:

- A 6-storey registered club and motel building (114 rooms)
- An 8-storey commercial office building with over 8,300sqm of floor space



A city with a flourishing arts and culture scene

Wollongong's fast-growing inner-city population has propelled the CBD's arts and culture scene. With more than 180 small bars, cafes and restaurants, Wollongong's thriving arts and evening economy continues to attract people.

As a founding member of the NSW Night Time Economy Councils Committee (NTECC), Wollongong City Council has been heavily involved in planning reforms in NSW to support a thriving night time economy and live music scene.

In 2024, 32 businesses across six Wollongong districts secured positions in the Office of the 24 Hour Economy Commissioner's Uptown District Acceleration Program designed to help businesses attract visitors to the local evening economy.



Wollongong Art Gallery One of the largest regional art museums in Australia with a collection of more than 3,500 works. Located in the heart of the CBD, this creative hub showcases diverse exhibitions, a range of public programs and events.



Illawarra Performing Arts Centre (IPAC)

Hosts internationally renowned theatre, music and comedy shows and a wide range of community events.

Thriving sectors in Wollongong

A dynamic tech hub driving national and global impact

Wollongong is home to a dynamic tech sector with successful companies serving national and international markets.

The city's established expertise in technology and strong pool of highly educated ICT professionals make it an ideal hub for tech businesses to innovate, grow, and thrive.

At the heart of Wollongong's tech community is Siligong Valley, a network of almost 1,800 tech professionals, entrepreneurs, and digital marketers to connect and scale. By fostering collaboration and showcasing local talent, the network is cementing Wollongong's place on the global tech map.



Case study: Scalapay

'Unicorn' buy now pay later fintech founded in 2019 by Johnny Mitrevski and Simone Mancini.

Named a 'unicorn' valued over \$1.9B in 2022, Scalapay services 8 million customers across Europe and employs over 190 staff globally.

With their technology headquartered in Wollongong, Scalapay is a magnet for tech talent in the region and is dedicated to the ongoing growth of the sector.

Clean energy

Wollongong is emerging as a global clean energy hub, with major projects in green hydrogen production, dual fuel power generation, offshore renewable energy and gas infrastructure, driving the region's transformation.

These transformative projects and assets are the cornerstone investments in NSW and Australia's decarbonised energy future.

Major energy projects:

More than \$750M in the following recently completed supportive major energy projects have transformed the region's energy ecosystem.

The Port Kembla Hydrogen Hub has an ambitious vision to create Australia's first 5 gigawatts green hydrogen hub. That vision is being realised with significant investment in major energy projects being delivered.

Coregas Hydrogen Refuelling Station has enabled Australia's first zero emissions heavy vehicle trials, including the Remondis hydrogen refuse truck.

Squadron Energy LNG Terminal at Port Kembla is Australia's first gas importation facility with potential to support gas exports in the future.

Jemena Port Kembla Pipeline Duplication + Eastern Gas Pipeline upgrades have delivered increased network capacity to east coast gas markets

EnergyAustralia construction of Tallawarra B and the Tallawarra A upgrade have delivered Australia's first dual fuel capable power stations.

Port of Port Kembla:

Port Kembla is an international trade gateway, New South Wales' largest motor vehicle import hub and is prepared to take on the role as the States next container terminal once Port Botany nears capacity. Its proximity and access to Sydney's west and south west means Port Kembla is well positioned to handle the expected growth in freight volumes.

Offshore renewable energy:

The Australian Government in June 2024 (after a period of public consultation) declared a 1,022 km² offshore wind zone off the coast of Wollongong, with the potential to generate up to 2.9 gigawatts of renewable energy.

A dedicated 30-hectare wind turbine assembly precinct has been proposed to support the assembly and floating of turbines to offshore locations. This area sits within the Illawarra Renewable Energy Zone and aligns with the Australian Government's proposed offshore wind development zone.

Illawarra Renewable Energy Zone

In February 2023, the NSW Government declared the Illawarra a Renewable Energy Zone (REZ), which could unlock a prospective 44 projects in the region worth \$43B in potential investment.

The Illawarra region is an ideal location due to its major energy, port and transport infrastructure coupled with a highly skilled workforce. The Illawarra has the advantage of not only becoming a source of clean energy production, but also an industrial user of clean energy, including hydrogen.

Since September 2023, over one thousand people have completed a Clean Energy Tour supported by Wollongong City Council and the NSW Government. These tours form a key element of the Port Kembla Hydrogen Hub education program.


New Projects:

BOC has received NSW Government funding to construct a 10 megawatt electrolyser to produce green hydrogen at their Port Kembla facility. The project will produce up to 4,000kg daily of green hydrogen that will be used to power some 40 fuel cell electric buses and trucks.

ATCO has received ARENA funding through the German-Australian HyGATE initiative to undertake feasibility on establishing a one gigawatt green hydrogen facility in the region.

Hydrogen bus trial – beginning in December 2023, a new zero-emissions NSW hydrogen bus trial started on the free inter-city Gong Shuttle bus route. The bus refuels at the new Coregas hydrogen station at the Port Kembla Hydrogen Hub.





Case study: Green Gravity

Repurposing Wollongong's disused mineshafts to store renewable energy.

Founded in 2021, Wollongong-based Green Gravity has developed innovative technology that repurposes disused mineshafts to store renewable energy. Their Gravitational Energy Storage System (GESS) converts gravitational energy into electricity, offering a cost-effective solution for long-duration renewable energy storage.

Green Gravity leverages Wollongong's pipeline of skilled engineers and UOW graduates to drive innovation and expansion. Collaborating with national and global partners like Glencore in QLD and the Romanian government, they are scaling their impact. In October 2024, they raised \$9M in Series A funding from investors including BlueScopeX, HMC Capital, Pacific Channel, and Sumitomo Corporation to accelerate commercialisation.

Case study: Hysata

Redefining the economics of green hydrogen production.

Hysata, founded in 2021, is commercialising an ultra-efficient capillary-fed alkaline electrolyser system, which will produce lowest cost green hydrogen.

Electrolysers split water into green hydrogen and oxygen using green electricity. Hysata electrolysers will accelerate deployment of green hydrogen as a chemical feedstock and support decarbonisation of hard-to-abate sectors such as steel, chemicals manufacture and long-distance heavy transport.

In May 2024, they raised US\$111.3M (AU\$172M) in Australia's largest-ever Series B funding for clean tech. The funding will expand their Wollongong-based manufacturing facility and advance their mission to achieve multigigawatt scale production, accelerating the global shift to green hydrogen.

Case study: V-DAQ

Founded by Paul Fenech & Rylan Kolb during their final year of Mechatronic Engineering at UOW, V-DAQ is a disruptive technology start-up providing transport companies with increased fleet visibility, payloads, productivity, and a simplified approach to managing regulatory and compliance obligations.

V-DAQ delivers an industry leading service to nearly 2,000 fleets across the Australian transport industry. With their entire team and proprietary technology development based in Wollongong on the Innovation Campus, V-DAQ provides a pathway for top talent (including UOW students and alumni) to pursue high-growth careers.

Their bootstrapped success showcases the opportunities for local founders. And this is just the beginning...

Advanced Manufacturing

Manufacturing is part of Wollongong's DNA, with over 110 years of innovation and expertise. The region hosts a diverse range of advanced industrial manufacturing operations, with unique strengths in machinery, equipment design, and manufacturing.

Advanced manufacturing continues to be an important growth sector for the local economy with many companies using advanced business models, processes and technology to compete on a domestic and global scale. This is underpinned by highly skilled professionals in design, engineering, R&D, fabrication, and quality assurance.

Close collaboration with the University of Wollongong enhances innovation, giving these companies a significant international competitive edge.

\$47M TAFE investment to strengthen Wollongong's talent pipeline

The Australian and NSW Governments are investing \$47M to establish the Illawarra Heavy Industry Manufacturing Centre of Excellence at TAFE NSW Wollongong.

The centre will focus on traditional and emerging manufacturing technologies such as digital, electrical, and robotic manufacturing. Courses will begin in 2025, with the full site refurbishment by 2027.

Wollongong also has a growing ecosystem of defence procurement, including manufacturing services and research. Combined with the capability of the Shoalhaven's defence assets, this highlights substantial opportunities in the region.

Wollongong companies offer a range of capabilities to the Defence industry:

- · Engineering design, project management
- · Advanced welding and fabrication
- Armour plate steel
- · Electrical isolators and enclosures
- Specialist protective coatings & blasting
- Ruggedised computers & communication
- · Gearbox design, manufacture, servicing
- · Cyber encryption capabilities

Case study: BlueScope National Product, Processing & Solutions Hub – state of the art plate processing

Complex solutions: The Hub supports customers with highly complex or significant projects in infrastructure, renewable energy, defence, transport, mining oil & gas, and agricultural industries.



Transforming our city's industrial precinct

The BlueScope Master Plan is one of the most significant land transformation and jobs creation opportunities in Australia.

After 18 months of intensive research, analysis and community engagement, BlueScope has unveiled the Master Plan to develop 200 hectares of excess landholdings adjacent to the Port Kembla Steelworks.

The Master Plan will see BlueScope transform the surplus land, next door to its steelmaking plant, into a next generation multi-industrial precinct with potential to create 30,000 jobs in emerging industries like clean energy, defence and modern manufacturing.

In the near term, BlueScope's focus will be on working closely with the NSW Government's whole-of-government working group to guide the redevelopment of the Port Kembla site. This will ensure the appropriate planning framework is in place to unlock the full potential of the land and bring the Master Plan vision to life. The working group will explore the potential for a SuperTAFE at Port Kembla to enhance local skills and support future workforce development.

\$2B pipeline of Major Projects in the region

As the Port Kembla Steelworks approaches its 100-year anniversary in 2028, BlueScope is planning for a low carbon emissions, modern manufacturing future.

BlueScope has approved over \$2B worth of major manufacturing projects in the region, which are either currently under construction or recently commissioned. These projects will deliver significant investment and growth in domestic manufacturing and product and service innovation, while also realising BlueScope's goal of being a low carbon emissions iron and steelmaker in Australia.

The \$2B investment will have a number of benefits for the region including:

- 500 new jobs created during construction
- Supporting around 10,000 direct and indirect jobs
- Manufacturing essential components for the clean energy transition
- >\$100M environment improvement upgrades
- Maximum local participation by local contractors and suppliers



A boom in creative industries

The Illawarra's natural beauty and skilled workforce have resulted in a booming local screen production industry, with 387 film permit applications in the last 5 years for increasingly larger productions.

The Illawarra was the backdrop for the Kingdom of the Planet of the Apes (2024)

NSW accounts for:

- \$1.64B in drama production targeted for 2026 (excluding corporate, commercial and documentary).

Screen Illawarra

Screen Illawarra is the local film body that builds and promotes the region's screen sector capabilities and has attracted several major film productions to the region. Screen Illawarra are working to attract the development of major production studios in Wollongong.

Case study: BBC Studios and the Death in Paradise spin off 'Return to Paradise'

Return to Paradise is an Australian–British television series and an original spin–off series of the global smash–hit murder mystery franchise Death in Paradise. The series premiered on ABC and ABC iview in September 2024 and is produced by BBC Studios Productions Australia with Red Planet Pictures.

Screen Illawarra assisted the first season of Return to Paradise with general consultation during pre production, including locations support, and scouted suitable local extras.
